Principles of Acting 20B is designed to continue the study of the acting process through the performance of selected monologs and scenes from contemporary dramatic scripts. Students will be exposed to the works of contemporary playwrights and experience the disciplinary requirements of the performing artist. Various acting techniques will be studied and the range of the human instrument expanded to improve the means for character development and the moment-to-moment life of the character/actor.
